To improve access to the results of RCL funded research, cooperation among researchers and enhanced research quality (less duplication of effort, transparency, reliability, academic integrity, effective dissemination)

To ensure better links with social partners in public and private sectors, NGO (synergies for innovation, feedback for taxpayers, better utilization of public funding, greater efficiency in general)



- **RCL seeks to establish OA as the standard in publishing of the scientific results, the standard that is applied without any financial, technical or legal restrictions. The RCL Policy on OA aims to achieve immediate, unrestricted, on-line access to peer-reviewed and published research and related data.**



OA to publications

any publication of a funded research such as journal articles and conference proceedings including monographs, studies, other books, (co-financed or not)

OA to publications plus related data

OA to data (with limitations)

output data generated through research and preserved in OA repositories and other research infrastructures



Green road or self-archiving/parallel publishing in an institutional repository or repository of a specific discipline, or on a personal website, as an additional step to publication in a journal obligatory for all RCL funded peer reviewed publications

Golden road or direct publication in a purely Open Access journal

Hybrid Open Access or a release for Open Access of a publication already published in a journal for a fee



Search for and re-use the content of published papers both manually and using automated tools (such as those for text and data mining) provided that any such re-use is subject to full and proper attribution and does not infringe any copyrights to third-party material included in the paper.



Timing

Publication on open access should not preclude prior publication in a recognized research journal or commercial publication. Embargo periods as foreseen by EC

Copyright

Publisher's copyright, licensing and embargo policies must be respected. The protection of intellectual property, in any form, arising from the publication takes precedence over open access depositing



- **Results of research is free of charge for the end user**
- **RCL covers OA publishing (APC) as eligible project expences during the transition and includes them into overheads after it**
- **RCL requires data management plans as a part of a project and special policies for the later long term curation**



To lodge their publications resulting in whole or in part from the funded research in an open access repository as soon as possible after publication or after an embargo period (6/12/24 months for different disciplines, genres)

- to deposit the publisher's version, if permitted, or the author's final version.
- to provide a link from the deposited version to the publication site, and also that the DOI (Document Object Identifier)
- to support research data wherever possible
- to provide metadata

To inform the RCL if the OA commitment will only be fulfilled at a later stage or not at all

To report on the fulfillment of the OA commitment



- **To draft the OA policy and to get it approved**
- **To adapt the RCL legislation and procedures to comply with it**
- **To finance the OA of publications**
- **To monitor the implementation of the and to make changes to it if necessary**
- **To coordinate the process nationally and to represent LT internationally**



The degree of flexibility in implementation of its policy allowed

- the length of embargo periods, during transition**
- negotiations with the publishers**
- waiving of OA demand in special cases**

Evidence-based review of the implementation and subsequent periodical reviews required

The RCL has the right to withhold funding if OA policy is ignored
